I went or started my education at the age of five. It was like a new chapter in my life because I knoew that education was the only key to success as President Nelson Mandela said.

My classes one to four, I didn't experience many problems and the tough road to my success started. I would on many occasions be sent home for exams and tuition money.

The year 2012 was one with many problems and uncertainties, but due to my desire of achieving, I persevered and never lost hope.

In that same year I sat for my Kenya Certificate of Primary Education. The results came out and I emerged the top in our school. I had 373 marks. This was the best performance the school had ever

The next year problems started again. The joining period of secondary school had begun. I had to stay for one term at home. The second term my grandpa had to sell one of his goats to send me to school. It was a glimmer of hope in my life. I was lagging behind in my notes and the class had already covered many topics at Imprezza. I worked hard and even managed to be the best in all the continuous assessments. I want to change the life of my people, the culture of my people and also help the less privileged in the society. One day if I achieve my dream of becoming a general surgery doctor, I can do these things.

I like reading novels during my leisure time and I dislike it when young, brilliant minds lose hope of achieving their goals. If I succeed in my (K.C.S.E) I would like to go to my dream universities of Pennsylvania and Nairobi from where I can achieve my goal.

A recent update on Mike, his mum has remarried and the stepdad does not want to know Mike. He is achieving A's in all subjects.


News From Imprezza

The wall and metal gates.


In December crops were harvested and the land has been left ready for planting in January. Amos and Edwin are doing an amazing job in developing the agriculture and rabbit husbandry.
